Minutes for September 18, 2011

The meeting of the STOS was called to order, informally, at 2:20PM. Because the primary purpose of this meeting was our annual orchid auction, the minutes will be brief:

Peter O'Connell, our Treasurer, gave a financial report that encompassed May 1st to September 1st. Our STOS experienced a loss for the first time. Expenses for monthly rental space and orchids and shipping (for the auction) increased exponentially, to name a few of the reasons for the loss.

Questions were asked with regard to the IRS and our "Not for Profit" status. Several phone calls were made in this regard and we continue to await clarification.

Anne Tinker, our President, noted that we have dates for the 2012 Southern Tier Orchid Society Annual Show at the Oakdale Mall. The dates are April 20, 21 and 22 in 2012. All judges from the past accepted an invitation to return, along with our past years' vendors. More information will follow AFTER the holidays.

Several speakers are lined up for future meetings and next month we will be looking for volunteers to organize the holiday party in December.

Luis Matienzo asked our members to try to attend the Syracuse (CNYOS) Show the first weekend in October: October 1st and 2nd. We are looking to represent our STOS by setting up an exhibit to represent us. We need members to collect their flowering plants to display. Please offer your time for

set up and display, as well as, tearing down. Plants for display need to go to Anne by the Thursday night before the show in Syracuse.

Some members are interested in being able to contact other members, via the membership list, in the future. Plans are underway, by me, to get an accounting of the way ALL members feel about the suggestion.

Our next meeting is scheduled for October 16, 2011 in the UPSTAIRS meeting room.

Treasurer's Report

Total funds available are \$7,036.73 and a CD of \$2,290.63, for a total of \$9,327.36. Last year the total funds available were \$8,701.58, plus a CD of \$2,290.63, for a total of \$10,992.21. Differences are in Show loss and purchase of projector.

Income and Expenses since the May report are as detailed in the spreadsheet Pete showed at the meeting.

The Show budget report is finalized in the spreadsheet. It was incomplete in May as the Show was later this year. We <u>lost</u> \$384.71 this year, (made \$369.16 in 2010), mostly due to having to purchase new posters (\$526.00), and increasing advertising from \$200 to \$400.

The CD renews this month. I will check for best rates.

AN EXPLORATION OF ORCHIDS

The distribution of orchids is quite extensive and varies throughout the world; however, little is known of those orchids that are not frequently seen because they may not have immediate commercial value. Orchids as plants are easily recognized by some specific characteristics, but some exceptions to these rules exist. Orchid fascination is not a new phenomenon and many legends and folk tales are known from different parts of the world. As the knowledge of nature developed through the centuries, classification methods for living organisms have also evolved from cumbersome formats to more accurate descriptions. These approaches are illustrated with some time-lines along with the use of current schemes to name and classify plants. This presentation will also try to explain why certain types of orchids exist in some areas of the world and the environmental factors leading to these results. Because many hybrids and species are known in our current population of orchids, examples of hybridization will also be presented to provide the audience with a flavor of time required for hybrid production. Finally, a series of orchid habitats, lesser known orchid species, and the future of orchids and orchid collecting will close this discussion.
