# What's New from the AOS

# Monthly Checklist for May and June

## Phalaenopsis

Except for the latest-spiking plants, all phalaenopsis should be ready for potting or already potted. Because phalaenopsis are tropical plants, they tend to be seasonal in their rooting behavior. **The critical point for potting is when new roots emerge from the base of the plant**. This is absolutely the best time to repot a phalaenopsis. The summer-flowering types, based on Doritis background, have ideally already been potted and are becoming freshly established, ready to support their soon-to-emerge spikes for the summer season.

*Phalaenopsis* potted at the right point in their growth cycle will reestablish almost immediately, with fresh roots growing into the new medium nearly uninterrupted. As soon as the flush of new root growth is seen, begin regular watering and fertilizing to make maximum use of the major growing season. Do not get over-exuberant with your watering, though, allowing water to splash between plants. This can be a source of infection for both waterborne pathogens and viral contamination. *Phalaenopsis* are much more susceptible to virus than was previously thought. Take extra care to keep your collection free of bacterial and viral problems, which you can accomplish by maintaining a clean growing area.

Our Orchid Show April 20-21 was a big success. Here are a few details and credits to those who helped make it a success.

We had 8 fabulous exhibits: GROS, CNYOS, STOS (3), Fair Orchids, J&L Orchids and a new vendor, Taida Orchids, who specialize in Phalaenopsis. A big thank you to members of our neighboring Societies who came to setup and take down their exhibits. Also, a big thank you to Laurel Shaefer, who designed our 1<sup>st</sup> place display, Laurel has become our unofficial display queen. STOS members brought so many plants that we needed to set up a 3<sup>rd</sup> display! Thanks to everyone who brought their beautiful blooming orchids.

We had a good turnout, 428 according to our clicker but likely more. We split the raffle this year, one on Saturday and one on Sunday. We sold 253 raffle tickets for \$644 and signed up 27 new members (at half price). The raffle lacked for blooming orchids and did not do as well as last year. We should provide some from the spring auction next year. We used our online system for new memberships and this went well. We did have to assist several people, but this was not difficult. At least all the entries are legible! Many helped at this table but I want to especially thank Mari Stover-Ling and Luke Engel, who are new members who spent a considerable time at the welcome table both days and did a great job. Thank you Mari and Luke!

We had good number of judges, assistant judges and clerks again this year. One of the assistant judges was the granddaughter of John Dunkelberger, one of our past, long time judges (featured on page 12) The judges gave out numerous ribbons and but no AOS awards, although several plants were considered.

This year we included 4 artist vendors:

- John Carnessali (Syracuse, NY): photography
- Christine Chin (Ithaca, NY): artist and photographer
- Raelynn Dieffenbach (Troy, PA): watercolors, mixed media
- Charlotte Holden (Lewisboro, NY): illustrator

Another new feature was a Terrarium Display featuring terrariums of various sizes from our members. I specifically want to spotlight Linda Mittel, our Secretary, and Jean Mint, our Program Chair, for arranging all the artists and the terrarium exhibit. Linda came up with these ideas on her own and she and Jean put a lot of time and energy into them. I think they made great additions to our show. Thank you very much Linda and Jean, you are amazing.

Always a popular part of the show was the scavenger hunt, run by Bernice Magee, our AOS rep. She also puts together information on vanilla and the vanilla orchid, and had a long vine of a vanilla plant on display, thanks to Josh DeMarree. We had some Orchid-gami (assembled by

Angel Caoile) ) on display and gave out, for a donation, unassembled ones. We 'sold' ~50 and ran out the first day. There were also maps of the world to locate orchid origins and Bernice gave out postcards of illustrated orchids. Thank you, Bernice for organizing and running this part of the show. It is very popular.

Renee DePrato had help from Jeffery Hackett with the registration this year and together they streamlined the process even more, thanks to Jeff's macro and coding skills. They were kept busy on Friday and Saturday, with last minute registration changes, working with the judges and recording the results. An efficient registration process allows the judging to go smoothly, and our judges really appreciate this. Thank you, Renee and Jeff for your efforts.

Geoffrey Gould, who has been our official photographer for many years, passed away a few weeks before the show, after a short stretch of poor health. (see obit on page 11). Luckily, we had a backup plan, and Christine Chin, a STOS member, stepped in. She set up for the AOS award photos, but unfortunately there weren't any. However, she was able to take high quality photos of all the exhibits with their ribbons before the public filled the space, as well as other pictures of the show. We are so lucky to have another talented photographer in the club. Thank you, Christine.

Emile Sacco and John Zygmunt demonstrated repotting techniques which were attended by over 50 people (standing room only, we need more chairs next year). This is a very popular event and I wish we had time to do more of it. Thank you, Emile and John.

Jane Trey stores many of the exhibit, judging, and food supplies, making several trips from her house to bring it all. Luckily, she has space in her basement and lives only a few blocks away. She ordered the Friday pizza and Saturday lunch and set up all the food tables, which is greatly appreciated by hungry judges and volunteers. 












## Our 2024 Orchid Show was dedicated to the memory of **Geoffrey Gould** Orchid Hobbyist and STOS Photographer



Geoffrey David Gould, 84, passed away in Johnson City, New York on April 16, 2024. Geof joined STOS in 2002 and, with his association to art clubs in the area, organized the art portion of our show for many years. He became our official photographer and has taken photos of 45 AOS award-winning orchids since 2002 for both STOS and CNYOS. His photos for STOS AOS awards are in a gallery on our website.

He will be greatly missed by his wife of almost 40 years, Elizabeth (Libby) Tucker Gould, many devoted family members and wonderful friends, and his sweet pets, Holly and Zorro.

Geof was born October 11, 1939 in Minneapolis, Minnesota. He graduated from Rutgers University in 1962. As coach of the Rutgers Hockey Club, he furthered the athletic careers of many students.

Geof had a long career as an admissions director, first at Rutgers and later at Binghamton University, where he succeeded in increasing the diversity of the student body, working closely with the Educational Opportunity Program. At Binghamton he received the Educational Opportunity Program's Faculty/Student Recognition Award in 1996, a Service Recognition Award in 2002, and the Council/Foundation Award in 2002.

After his retirement in 2002, Geof enjoyed being an active member of the Cooperative Gallery and the Southern Tier Orchid Society. He gave many shows of his beautiful photographs, some of which he had taken on his trips with Libby to Europe and South America.

# John Dunkelberger

Recognized by the AOS with the Norito Hasegawa Award for Excellence in Hybridization



John Dunkelberger has been a judge at the STOS show for many years. His wife, Shirley, who often came with him, passed away last December and there was a celebration of life in her honor on April 27. Right: Cyrtocidium Golden Ruffles 'Ruffled Vision' AM/AO**S**.

John Dunkelberger is a hobbyist, grower and hybridizer who has achieved success particularly with miniature cymbidiums and Oncidinae crosses. He has originated 78 registered hybrids in 24 genera, and is best known for his work with oncidiums. In 1991, he made the foundational hybrid, Cyrtocidium (Odontocidium) Roger Cole (Cyrtochilum retusum × Oncidium maculatum), which has garnered four AOS quality awards, one cultural award and most notably the Award of Distinction.

John's understanding of the breeding characteristics of Cyrtocidium Roger Cole has given rise to its being the direct parent of 26 registered hybrids, all but one of which have been awarded.. He continued this line of breeding into the second and third generations, giving rise to a cluster of Oncidinae with branched inflorescences and medium-sized, intensely colored, chocolate and gold flowers.

John is also known for his novelty hybridizing in the Cymbidium Alliance, exploring the smaller flowered Chinese and pendent cymbidiums. Fourteen of his 17 cymbidium hybrids have garnered 33 AOS awards. John has been an accredited AOS judge for more than five decades and became an Emeritus Judge in 2019. He continues to judge and gives generously of his time as teacher and mentor, including to two of his granddaughters, who are now student judges.
