Getting your Blooming Orchid Ready for the Show

Pests

Any orchid in bloom can be put on our displays, as long as it is free of pests. Definitely look your plants over for scale and mealybugs. If you find only a few, use a cotton swab dipped in 70% isopropanol and wipe them off. If there are many, you can fill a small spray bottle with 70% isopropanol and a bit of dish detergent (to help it wet the leaves) and spray the plant well, especially crevices. Peel and cut off dried sheaths from pseudobulbs, pests often live underneath. Dried sheaths are dead, the plant won't care. Don't spray the flowers, though mealy bugs like flowers, so look them over well, especially long-blooming Phals, and remove those bugs with the swab method.

Contrary to what you might think, 70% isopropanol is better to use than 90%. This is because 90% contains so little water that insects, etc. are less likely to absorb it, and it evaporates more quickly. When I worked in a lab, we always used 70% ethanol to disinfect surfaces. Isopropanol is safe for plants, don't use ethanol or methanol (which are harder to find anyway).

If you have only a few bugs, check the plant often, especially right before you bring it. If it has been clean for several days, you can bring it. If you have many bugs, especially near the base of the plant or under the sheaths, you probably should not bring it, as that means you have a larger infestation that may be in the media. Keep treating it though.

Presentation

You also want to have the flowers presented nicely and the plant itself looking good. Stake the flowers if needed. Cut off yellow leaves or leaves that look ugly for whatever reason. If there are lots of leaves, the plant can afford to lose one or two. If the leaves are dusty or water-spotted, wipe them down with water or vinegar or lemon juice to remove water spots. Luis has said that a wipe with milk will give a nice shine. Aerial roots are common, and if they appear to be alive, keep them. But if they are truly totally dried out, you can cut them off.

Getting your Blooming Orchid Ready for the Show (cont.)

Register your Orchid

Figuring out the class your orchid is in is not as hard as you may think. The list of classes looks daunting at first, but just relax and read through it. The classes are grouped and some groups (Alliances) you should be familiar with. Look at the label that came with your orchid. It should have an abbreviation of the genus, followed by one or more other names. The genus (plural genera) is often the same name as the group, eg Onc. for Oncidium, Den for Dendrobium, Phal, Phrag, C. for Cattleya. Lc, Rlc, Bc, many (not all) that end in c. are Cattleya hybrids. Pot. Is also a Catt. Some groups have several common genera that you may recognize, like Miltonia, Brassia, Dracula, Masdevallia, Bulbophyllum. If you have one of these, there is only one class possible.

Bring your orchid

If you live nearby, you can bring your orchids to the Museum on Friday, between 2:00 - 3:00 is best. You will need to make a label for your orchids, this year we will have someone to help you with that. You should put your name on each pot, it will be covered with black cloth. If you have a box you would like back, put your name on that too.

If you live in the general Ithaca area and can't come on Friday, we can arrange to bring your plants and return them.

Plants need to be picked up on Sunday between 4-5pm. The museum closes at 5:00 sharp.

We can also use some greenery for our displays. Non-flowering, leafy houseplants, ferns especially, make good fillers.
